The Mets acquired Dave Kingman from the Giants to add power to the ball club and he didn't disappoint. He blasted 36 homers to lead the Mets and set a then-franchise record for a season... "Rusty" Staub became the first Met to drive in 100 or more base runners with his team high one-hundred five. He also led the Mets in runs scored (93) and finished second in home runs (19). Greatly underrated as a second baseman, Felix Millan led the ball club in hits (191) and crossed the plate 81 times. Del Unser joined the Mets in a trade with the Phillies for "Tug" McGraw and drilled ten round-trippers. Unser had 58 RBI and Kingman drove home 88 for the year. The Mets hit .256 as a team (the highest batting average in team history at that point) and 101 home runs... Tom Seaver won his third N.L. Cy Young Award with 22 victories, 243 strikeouts, and 15 complete games including five shutouts. Jon Matlack added 16 wins and Jerry Koosman 14 victories to lead the starters. Koosman struck out 173 batters and completed 11 games with four shutouts. The pitching staff posted a 3.39 ERA and led the league with 989 strikeouts... Yogi Berra was let go as manager, August 6th, with a record of 56-53. He was replaced by Roy McMillan who was the FIRST person within the Mets' organization to be hired for the Manager's job. He had been managing the Mets' Triple A team before his appointment... One of the last of the "Amazin' Mets," Cleon Jones, was released at the end of July... The Mets' first skipper, Charles Dillon "Casey" Stengel, passed away on September 29th... Casey had originally planned to be a dentist. Good thing he chose baseball instead... New York finished 10 1/2 games behind the first place Pirates who won thirteen of eighteen games in the season series.
