The great A's dynasty of Charlie Finley is on the wane. Despite the loss of 1974's Cy Young Award winner, "Catfish" Hunter, the A's were 55-32 by July 14th. During the season, Finley chastised the city of Oakland for not supporting his ball club since attendance at ball games--though never among the A.L.'s leaders--was falling lower and lower. Hunter left the A's because Finley reneged on an annuity payment to be set aside for the pitcher's future. Baseball's Commissioner, Bowie Kuhn, declared Hunter a free agent which led him to sign with the Yankees. In the meantime, Finley was constantly looking for an escape from the Bay Area...Oakland is swept, 3-0, in the ALCS by the Red Sox who went on to have that classic 1975 World Series with "The Big Red Machine." It won't be long before other A's stars like Jackson, Rudi, Bando, Blue, Fingers, Tenace, and Campaneris move on as Hunter did. If Connie Mack only knew... Reggie Jackson had a terrific season with 36 homers, 104 RBI, and 91 runs scored to lead the ball club. Gene Tenace added 29 homers and 87 RBI. Designated hitter Billy Williams (the former Cubs star) clubbed 23 dingers and drove in eighty-one. Joe Rudi socked 21 home runs while Sal Bando added fifteen. The A's hit .254 and finished second in the A.L. with 151 homers...Vida Blue led the pitching staff with a 22-11 record and 189 strikeouts. He tied Ken Holtzman for the team lead with 13 complete games and two shutouts. Holtzman was 18-14 with 122 K's. Dick Bosman won eleven games and closer "Rollie" Fingers was a winner ten times. He struck out 115 batters. The staff was second in the league with a 3.27 ERA while allowing the fewest home runs (102) for the year.
