The Nats were the N. L. leaders with a .265 batting average and tied the Cardinals for the most stolen bases (116). They hit a bushel-full of home runs (231) led by both MVP-candidate Anthony Rendon and twenty-year-old emerging super-star Juan Soto (34). Rendon was also the team's high-man with 126 RBI, 174 base hits, 117 runs scored, and 44 doubles. His fielding was of Gold Glove caliber...The pitching staff finished in the middle-of-the-pack in ERA (4.27) but boasted four starters among the best in the game. Stephen Strasburg was 18-6 in wins/losses and topped the staff with 251 strikeouts. Max Scherzer dealt with nagging but minor injury woes and ended the year 11-7 with 243 K's. Newcomer Patrick Corbin won fourteen and Anibal Sanchez eleven...The Nats qualified for the post-season as the N. L.'s number one Wild Card team after a dismal 19-31 start. Rumors seemed to abound everywhere about the manager's eroding job security. They posted a 74-38 mark the rest of the way to reach the post-season. The Nationals beat Milwaukee, 4-3, to advance to the NLDS where a very good Dodger ball club was eliminated three games to two. Next up, the Cardinals in the NLCS who were swiftly disposed of, 4-0, to send the Montreal/Washington franchise to its first World Series versus the Houston Astros...In a seven-game Fall Classic, the Nats won four road contests while the opposing Astros won three in D. C. Behind the dominating pitching of Series MVP Stephen Strasburg (2 wins, 14 K's, 4 ER in 14.3 innings pitched), a Washington baseball franchise raised its first World Series crown since the American League Senators (now the Twins) in 1924.
