The Dodgers won the National League pennant by just one game over the Cardinals. (Saint Louis won the season series, 12-10-1)...The true highlight of the year was Jackie Robinson becoming the first African-American to win the league's Most Valuable Player Award. Roy Campanella, Gil Hodges, and "Duke" Snider became everyday and prominent players for the first time...Hodges and Snider both led the Dodgers with 23 home runs. Hodges was second to Robinson's team leading 124 RBI with one hundred fifteen while Carl Furillo knocked home one hundred six. Campanella hit 22 home runs and drove in eighty-two. Furillo had 18 taters and shortstop/captain Harold "Pee Wee" Reese added 16 dingers and led the team with 132 runs scored. Robinson hit 16 home runs, scored 122 times, and led the Dodgers with 203 hits. Jackie also led the National League with 37 stolen bases and in batting average. He hit for a "triple double" in his MVP season, which included 38 doubles and 12 triples. Brooklyn hit .274 and led the N.L. with 152 home runs and 112 stolen bases...Don Newcombe, the National League Rookie of the Year, topped the pitching staff with a 17-8 W/L record, 149 K's, 19 complete games, and five shutouts. "Preacher" Roe won fifteen contests, Ralph Branca thirteen, and Joe Hatten twelve. The staff was second in the league with a 3.80 ERA and led the N.L. with 15 shutouts...With all those great seasons from individual players and the team as a whole, the Dodgers fell to the Yankees once more in the World Series. The Yanks won this one, four games to one. The teams split the first two games at Yankee Stadium, but the Yankees swept the next three, the last a 10-6 New York victory at Ebbets Field...It was "Wait 'til next year!" again which had become an all too familiar rallying cry for Dodger fanatics. Their beloved "Bums" had been bridesmaids in 1941 and 1947 as well...
