Yogi Berra led the '52 Yankees with 30 homers, 98 runs batted in, and 97 runs scored. Twenty-year old Mickey Mantle, having supplanted the beloved Joe DiMaggio in Yankee Stadium's cavernous-like outfield, blasted 23 home runs, drove in eighty-seven, and led the team with 171 base hits. ("Joe D." had retired in December 1951.) He was second to Berra after scoring 94 runs. Joe Collins followed with 18 taters while Hank Bauer added seventeen to the Yanks' season total of 129 circuit clouts. They led the American League with a .267 batting average, 56 triples, and 1,411 hits. New York was second in the A.L. with 727 runs...Allie Reynolds' 20-8 W/L record, 160 strikeouts, 24 complete games, and six shutouts led the pitching staff. Vic Raschi ended the year 16-6; spot starter Johnny Sain won eleven; and Eddie Lopat was a ten-game winner. The Yankee hurlers led the A.L. with a 3.14 ERA and seventeen shutouts...Reynolds was runner-up in league MVP voting; Mantle finished third and Berra fourth..."The Bronx Bombers" won their fourth consecutive World Championship after getting past the Dodgers, four games to three. It tied the record set by Yankee ball clubs from 1936 through 1939. Second sacker Billy Martin, who called the bench "home" for the year's first two months before Gil McDougald switched to third following Bobby Brown's departure for military service, likely saved this Yankee team's World Championship. His desperation catch of Jackie Robinson's short pop-up near the mound late in Game Seven, may have been the play of the year. Mickey Mantle hit the first of his record eighteen World Series home runs in Game Six at Yankee Stadium. He batted .345 in the Fall Classic with two home runs. Johnny Mize hit a lusty .400, three homers, and drove in eight. Vic Raschi was 2-0, Allie Reynolds 2-1 in The Series.
