A lot of runs were scored in the 1960 World Series as the Bucs and Yankees did a redux from 1927. (The Murderers' Row Yanks won the Fall Classic that year.) The Yankees outscored the Pirates in three games with lopsided 16-3, 10-0, and 12-0 routs, but Pittsburgh won the series in walk-off fashion in Game Seven on Bill Mazeroski's famous home run off Ralph Terry in the 10-9 finale at Forbes Field...Dick Groat was named the National League MVP--an award Roberto Clemente felt HE deserved. ("The Great One" received one in '66)...Elroy Face and his forkball for an out-pitch came to prominence with his stellar relief throughout The Series for the Buccos... *Team leaders: Dick Stuart (23 home runs, 83 RBI); Clemente (16 dingers, 94 RBI); Don Hoak (16 homers, 79 RBI, 97 runs scored); and Bob Skinner (15 home runs, 86 RBI). Groat, who led the majors in batting average, posted a team high 186 base hits for the season...Vernon Law led the pitching staff with a 20-9 W/L record and 18 complete games. Bob Friend was 18-12 and topped the staff with 183 K's. "Vinegar Bend" Mizell won thirteen and Harvey Haddix captured eleven victories. The Pirates finished third in the N.L. with a 3.49 ERA. They allowed the fewest hits, home runs, and bases on balls...The Bucs offensively led the league with a .276 batting average, as well as runs scored (734), hits (1,493), and doubles (236). They hit 120 homers (6th)...The Pirates outdistanced the Braves by seven games to win the pennant--their first in 33 years. The Bucs won the season series, 13-9...Groat was nearly traded to Kansas City for Roger Maris during the off-season. Danny Murtaugh, the N.L.'s Manager of the Year, pleaded with GM Joe Brown to keep Groat before the exchange could be made.*
