For the entire decade of the 1970s the Pirates year after year fielded some of the best teams and star players the game has ever seen. Roberto Clemente, now a vocal leader on the ball club--if not entirely by example on the diamond--seemed to use his iron will to lead this ball club to success in the '71 post-season... Willie Stargell would lead the Bucs on offense with an MVP-caliber season after slamming 48 home runs, driving home 125, and scoring 104 runs. Bob Robertson followed with 26 taters and 72 RBI. Richie Hebner socked 17 homers while Al Oliver finished with fourteen. As for Clemente, "The Great One" popped 13 home runs and led the ball club with 178 base hits. He ended the year fourth in the majors and N.L. in batting average. The Buccos were second in the league with a .274 team average. They were FIRST in homers (154), triples (61), hits (1,555), and runs scored (788)... The pitching staff was ranked third in the N.L. with a 3.31 ERA. Dock Ellis led the staff with a 19-9 W/L record and 137 strikeouts. Steve Blass went 15-8 and topped the staff with twelve complete games and five shutouts. Bob Moose won eleven while lefty Luke Walker was a ten-game winner. Spot-starter Nellie Briles was 8-4 for the season... The Bucs beat the Giants in the NLCS, three games to one, before defeating the Orioles in a fabulous World Series, four games to three. Steve Blass was the triumphant winning pitcher and hero in Game Seven. But the '71 Fall Classic fittingly showcased Roberto Clemente who hit .414 and made a handful of incredible throws from his right field position to thwart The Birds. He seemed to carry the Pirates on his back to win this World Championship according to some teammates, and Clemente, without saying a word was proud to do it. Roberto had felt for quite sometime that his life on this Earth would be a short one. Perhaps his performance in the '71 World Series was motivated by his premonition... On June 25, 1971, Stargell hit the longest home run in the history of Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium. It came in the second inning off former teammate Jim Bunning. The titanic blast landed in the ball park's 600 level (second from the top) and was said to be still on the rise when it landed in an EXIT portal and rolled into a concourse. The actual distance of the bomb has never been determined. The spot was marked with a yellow star and black "S".
