After coming so close to winning the American League pennant in '67, the Tigers came out of the starting gate in '68, 9-1, to open the season. At the end of April, they were 12-4 and by May 10th, they had moved into first place for the rest of the year. The Tigers struck fear in their opponents not only because they hit a bushel of homers (185, first in the A. L.) but they developed the habit of finding a way to win games with late-inning comebacks and some with home runs at very critical times. Willie Horton gave the Senators' Frank Howard a run for his money for the home run title, but at season's end, Horton led the Tigers with 36 dingers and 85 RBI. Bill Freehan and Norm Cash both hit 25 home runs; the former had 84 RBI the latter sixty-three. Jim Northrup hit 21 homers and led the team with 90 RBI and 153 hits. Second baseman Dick McAuliffe compiled a "triple double": 24 doubles, 10 triples, and 16 home runs. He led the ball club with 95 runs scored. For the season, Detroit hit .235...In "The Year of the Pitcher," Denny McLain became the first 30-game winner on the mound since 1934. For his 31-6 W/L record, ERA under 2.00, 28 complete games, 280 strikeouts, and six shutouts, he was named the American League's MVP and won the Cy Young Award. Mickey Lolich was 17-9, had 10 complete games and 197 K's. Earl Wilson won thirteen and Joe Sparma ten to round out the rotation. Wilson, a good hitter well known for his power, slugged seven home runs and knocked in seventeen. The staff's ERA of 2.71 was third in the A. L.; their 59 complete games led the league...In the World Series, the Tigers faced the St. Louis Cardinals who quickly took a three games to one advantage. In Game Five, Detroit almost immediately went down by three runs but came back to win, 5-3. It was Lolich's second win of the Series and second complete game. On two days rest, McLain won Game Six then Lolich did the same to start Game Seven at Busch Stadium. The Cards' Bob Gibson and Lolich both pitched a scoreless game through six innings until the last of the seventh. Jim Northrup tripled on a fly ball which sailed over the head of Curt Flood after the latter took a step toward home then had to race back to try to catch the ball. The extra base hit drove in Norm Cash for a 1-0 lead. Detroit would win the game, 4-1, with Lolich pitching his THIRD complete game for his third win of the Series. He was named the '68 Fall Classic's Most Valuable Player.
