After winning a highly disappointing 79 games in '71, the Reds in the pre-season called 1972 "The Year of Redemption." Johnny Bench bounced back from a sub-par season in 1971 to win the National League's MVP Award after hitting 40 home runs, knocking in 125, and winning his fifth Gold Glove Award...What really changed the Reds were the acquisitions of Joe Morgan and Cesar Geronimo in a trade with Houston in the off-season. Reds fans were up-in-arms when the popular and highly productive Lee May went in the trade to the Astros. Many felt Morgan and Geronimo weren't the caliber of player as was Lee May. Both proved the front office knew exactly what they were doing, Morgan earlier than the slick-fielding, rifle-armed Geronimo...Bobby Tolan, a key hitter and superb outfielder, had missed the entire '71 season with a torn Achilles tendon. His return added some much-needed punch to the line-up...Morgan went on to hit 16 homers, drive in 73 runs, and lead the N.L. with 122 runs scored. Tolan hit eight home runs, but drove in eighty-two. Geronimo hit for his highest career batting average and played a Gold Glove-style outfield. Tony Perez smacked 21 dingers and had 90 RBI. Pete Rose led the team with 198 hits and was second in runs scored (107). The Redlegs hit .251, 124 homers, and led the majors with 140 steals...Gary Nolan topped the pitching staff with fifteen wins; Ross Grimsley won fourteen; and Jack Billingham ended the season with twelve victories. Closer Clay Carroll led the league with 65 appearances and the majors with 37 saves. The Reds' staff had a 3.21 ERA and led the N.L. with 60 saves...Cincinnati beat the pesky Pirates in a hard-fought NLCS, three games to two, but lost to the Oakland A's in the '72 Fall Classic, four games to three. ("The Big Red Machine" is now up and rolling through the 1981 season)...Former Redleg hurler Joe Nuxhall, now a Reds' play-by-play man, used to conclude each radio broadcast with the line: "This is the old lefthander rounding third and heading for home. Good night everybody!" Al Michaels also shared the radio booth with Nuxhall before embarking on his famous and long TV network career...The Reds beat the Dodgers, 9-5, and the Astros, 11-6, in their respective season series.
