The Mets were plagued with injuries for most of the season, but in a mediocre NL East, they were only 5 ½ games out of first place at the end of August. Bolstered by Tug McGraw's "Ya Gotta Believe!" rallying cry, the Mets won five of their last seven games to win the division and became the team with the LOWEST winning percentage (.509) to go to the World Series at that time. After beating the Reds (highlighted by a scuffle between Pete Rose and Buddy Harrelson at second base during Game Three) in the NLCS, the Oakland A's—in the middle of their early 70s dynasty—outlasted the Metropolitans in the '73 Fall Classic, four games to three. Willie Mays, perhaps the greatest major league player ever, ended his career in the city where it all began as a Giant in 1951... "Rusty" Staub was as beloved in New York as he was in Montreal as "Le Grand Orange." Staub, who slugged 15 homers, led the ball club with 76 RBI. John Milner was tops with 23 dingers while knocking in 72 runs. Wayne Garrett added 16 homers and 58 RBI... Tom Seaver led the pitching staff with 19 wins, 251 strikeouts, and 18 complete games. Jerry Koosman and Jon Matlack each won fourteen games. Matlack was second with 205 K's and 14 complete games. Lefthander George Stone was a 12-game winner. Mets' batters hit .246 for the season and 85 home runs. The staff was third in the N.L. with a 3.26 ERA and first with 1,027 strikeouts... The Mets won the season series with the second place Cardinals, 10-8, which New York needed to win the division by 1 ½ games. The fifth place Cubs were just five games in back of the Mets at season's end.
