Charlie Finley's mustachioed A's fought among themselves and beat everybody else on the field as they won their third straight World Championship, four games to one, over the Dodgers. (The first Fall Classic played ENTIRELY on the West Coast.)...Reggie Jackson led the A's with 29 homers and 90 runs scored. He knocked in ninety-three. Sal Bando popped 22 home runs and was team leader with 103 runs batted in. Gene Tenace added 26 dingers and 73 RBI while Joe Rudi hit 22 homers, drove home ninety-nine, and led the ball club in base hits (174) and doubles (39). As a team, the A's hit .247, 132 home runs, and were first in the A.L. with 164 stolen bases..."Catfish" Hunter won the American League Cy Young Award with 25 wins, a team leading 23 complete games and six shutouts. Vida Blue posted 17 victories, 12 complete games, and led the pitching staff with 174 K's. Ken Holtzman was a 19-game winner. The staff ERA was a league best 2.95 with the fewest runs allowed (551), bases on balls (430), and home runs (90)...Closer "Rollie" Fingers was World Series MVP...The A's knocked off Baltimore, 3-1, in the ALCS after the teams split their season series, 6-6... Oakland drew just over 845,000 spectators to the Alameda County Coliseum; the only thing the ball club did was play exciting baseball in extending their dynasty in the early 70s. What's more, Mr. Finley tried to **SELL** the team for 15 million dollars during the season...World-class sprinter Herb "Hurricane" Washington was signed to be used solely as a "designated pinch runner." He had last played baseball in high school. Washington was picked off by the Dodgers' Mike Marshall at a critical point in the ninth inning of Game Two during the World Series. He was let go the following year after attempts to make him a position player, as well, failed...Hunter tied the Rangers' Fergie Jenkins for the most wins in the majors.
