Ryan Zimmerman posted a season many expected would be a norm for his career: a team leading 36 home runs and 108 RBI. Daniel Murphy (23 homers, 93 RBI) had a team high 172 base hits and 43 doubles. Bryce Harper popped 29 dingers and led the ball club with 95 runs scored. Anthony Rendon slugged 25 home runs and drove in one-hundred. The Nats hit .266 for the year and 215 home runs...Max Scherzer won his third Cy Young Award and second consecutive in the N.L. He led the league with 268 strikeouts (12.02/nine innings). Scherzer was 16-6 for the season. "Gio" Gonzalez and Stephen Strasburg both won fifteen ballgames with Gonzalez tallying 188 K's and Strasburg 204 punch outs, respectively. The pitching staff was third in the N.L. in ERA (3.88)...After winning the NL East for the fourth time in six seasons, Washington ended the year in disappointing fashion after dropping their NLDS match-up with the Cubs, three games to two. The early exit cost manager "Dusty" Baker his job following just two seasons and a record of 192-132 but no World Series championship. This was considered the team to finally win it all...Adam Eaton, obtained in a trade with the White Sox to help ignite the offense while batting first or second in the line-up, was lost for the year April 29<sup>th</sup> after knee surgery.
