The Dodgers won their fifth straight NL West crown and posted the most victories for the franchise during its time in L. A. By August 25th, they led the division by 21 games and were 55 games over .500. They completed an 11-game winning streak in July but began to falter in September--an 11-game LOSING streak bringing them closer to the pack. Their lead at season's end was 11 games...N.L. Rookie of the Year Cody Bellinger showed he "belonged" from the start. He led the ball club with 39 home runs, 97 RBI, and 87 runs scored. Corey Seager (159) topped the Dodgers in base hits. L. A. hit .249 and 221 homers, the latter fourth in the league...On the pitching rubber, the Dodgers led the N.L. in ERA (3.38) and strikeouts (1,549). Clayton Kershaw was the staff leader going 18-4 in wins/losses with 202 K's. Alex Wood went 16-3 while Kenta Maeda won 13 games and Rich Hill twelve. Closer Kenley Jansen rang up 109 punch outs...After eliminating the Diamondbacks and Cubs in the NLDS and NLCS, respectively, the Dodgers and Houston Astros played a World Series keeping viewers on the edge of their seats. Houston would prevail, four games to three.
