The Dodgers 1977 edition featured FOUR hitters who launched 30 or more home runs. The 1978 team had three players hit as least 21 homers. Reggie Smith (93 RBI) was the leader after slugging twenty-nine. Ron Cey clubbed 23 dingers and drove in 84 runs. Steve Garvey added 21 home runs and led the ball club in RBI (113) and base hits (202). Garvey, who finished fourth in the majors in batting average, took home the All Star Game MVP Award and the Most Valuable Player Award of the NLCS. Davey Lopes scored the most runs (93) and was third in National League stolen bases...After a game in New York on August 20th, a Washington Post writer quoted pitcher Don Sutton as saying that even though Garvey appeared to be the All American boy he WASN'T the best player on the team. Sutton alluded to the fact people were tired of always hearing about Garvey's "squeaky clean image." He felt Reggie Smith was the best player and *de facto* leader because he never promoted himself to the press and went about his business like a pro. Garvey learned of the comments Sutton had made to the writer and called-out Sutton, resulting in a two-minute wrestling scuffle in the Dodger clubhouse. Teammates pulled the two apart; no one was hurt except for facial scratches and Garvey's black eye. Sutton later publicly apologized for the tussle but never to Garvey face-to-face...The pitching staff was the National League leader with a 3.12 ERA. There were FIVE double-digit winners: Burt Hooton (19), Tommy John (17), both Sutton and Doug Rau (15), and Rick Rhoden (10). Sutton, no slouch himself on the pitching rubber, collected the most strikeouts (154) and complete games (12). Burt Hooton completed ten ball games. The staff, overall, was second in the N. L. with a total of 46 complete games...The Dodgers sent the Phillies home packing by beating the Phils in the NLCS for the second straight year. The World Series was a different story: Yankee bats hit to the tune of .306 and had little trouble conquering Dodger pitching. The Yanks won the Series 4-2 and outscored L. A. 36-23...The team was first in the league with a .264 batting average and 149 home runs.
