With his calm demeanor, Walter Alston managed the Dodgers from 1954 up to the final four games of the season before he abruptly resigned. He compiled 2,063 wins--23 of those in the post season. What's more, he was named National League Manager of the Year six times and signed one-year contracts to lead the Dodgers for his entire reign. Alston won seven pennants and four World Championships. His successor, Tommy Lasorda, a career Dodger, managed the ball club for the next twenty years...L. A. held or was tied for the top spot in the NL West for 24 days, the last being June 3rd. For the rest of the season, it would be the Cincinnati Reds leading the division. After the All Star break, the Dodgers would be no closer to first place than five games, July 15-17...Ron Cey was the club leader with 23 home runs. He was tied by Steve Garvey for the team lead in RBI with eighty. Garvey popped 13 homers while leading the ball club with 200 base hits, 85 runs scored, and 37 doubles. He was also awarded a Gold Glove. Catcher Steve Yeager was good for eleven dingers; mid-season pick-up Reggie Smith added ten. During the season, the Dodgers hit .251 and 91 homers...With a won/loss record of 21-10, Don Sutton was the leader of the pitching staff as were his 161 strikeouts and 15 complete games. He tied Burt Hooton (11-15) with four shutouts. Lefty Doug Rau won 16 ballgames while Rick Rhoden and closer Charlie Hough were both 12-game winners. Tommy John finished ten and ten. The staff ended the year second in the N.L. with a 3.02 ERA...A second place finish to the Reds by 10 full games was the Dodgers' lot in the NL West...They lost season series to the Reds (5-13) and the Giants (8-10).
