Greg Luzinski led the Phillies with 39 homers, 130 RBI, and 35 doubles. Mike Schmidt had an MVP-type season with 27 doubles, 11 triples, 38 home runs, and a team leading 114 runs scored. He would finish 10th in the MVP vote. Centerfielder Garry Maddox won his third Gold Glove and socked 27 doubles, 10 triples, and 14 homers. The mid-season acquisition of "Bake" McBride put the Phillies over the top with his plus-.300 batting average, 11 dingers, and 20 doubles. Larry Bowa had the team high in base hits (175). The Phils led the N.L. in batting average (.279), runs scored (847) and ended the year second in homers (186)...Steve Carlton was tops on the pitching staff with 23 wins, 198 strikeouts, and 17 complete games. Larry Christenson was 19-6 while Jim Lonborg won eleven and lefty Randy Lerch ten games. The staff finished fourth in the league in ERA (3.71). Their 47 saves also led the N.L...

The Phillies won their second straight NL East title by five games over arch-rival Pittsburgh...The Phils won their first post-season game since the 1915 World Series when they beat the Dodgers in Game One of the NLCS at Dodger Stadium, 7-5. The last two games at Veterans Stadium will live on in infamy with Phillies' fans: A Game Three loss featured the Philly "boo birds" literally driving Dodger starter Burt Hooton from the mound with their incessant, derisive boos in protest of Hooton's constant gesturing about questionable ball/strike calls. What's more, leftfielder Greg Luzinski badly misplayed a Manny Mota fly ball which opened the gates for the Dodgers' three-run rally in the ninth inning after the Phillies had led, 5-3. Game Four, with Steve Carlton starting on short rest, was played in horrible conditions as a steady drizzle and then rain fell throughout the game. The Dodgers bested Carlton, 4-1, to win the series, three games to one.
