Ever since the bankrupt Seattle Pilots left after one season (1969) in a move to Milwaukee, various interests were urgently seeking and lobbying for a ball club to matriculate to the Pacific Northwest. Their long-held hopes and interests were finally answered when the city was selected to be part of another round of expansion. The team would play under the roof of The Kingdome until July 1999. The principle owner of the new team was entertainer Danny Kaye...A smattering of cast-offs and wannabes made up the Mariners at the very beginning. Leroy Stanton would lead the team with 27 home runs and tie Dan Meyer for the most runs batted in (90). A very talented Ruppert Jones followed with 24 dingers and a team high 85 runs scored. Meyer went on to hit 22 home runs and top the M's with 159 base hits. Bill Stein popped 13 homers and tied Jones for the team lead in doubles (26). Twenty-two year old second baseman Julio Cruz would prove to be a very valuable commodity for the next few seasons. The switch-hitter made his debut July 4th going two for three at the plate. The M's finished eleventh in batting (.256) and eighth in home runs (133)...Glenn Abbott was the big winner on the pitching staff with 12 victories. He completed seven games and had 100 K's. Swing-man John Montague was 8-12 and reliever/closer Enrique Romo posted eight wins. He also led the staff with 105 strikeouts. Starter Dick Pole was a seven-game winner. The staff ended the year LAST in the A.L. with a 4.83 ERA...The Mariners won ten more ball games than their expansion counterparts in Toronto and finished just one-half game ahead of the last place Oakland A's in the AL West.
