The Orioles were World Champions in 1966 and followed that with a 76-win season in 1967. The 1968 campaign found The Birds back-on-track. Baltimore spent a great majority of the year in second place, but briefly held the American League lead from May 3rd through May 8th with their largest advantage 2 ½ games. After the All Star break, the closest the Orioles came to first place was four games following a doubleheader sweep of the Oakland A's, August 27th. In their final thirty games, the ball club was 13-17 dropping them twelve games behind the pennant-winning Tigers at the end of the season... "Boog" Powell was the team leader with 22 home runs and 85 RBI. Brooks Robinson played in all 162 games, hit 17 homers, drove home 75 runs, won his ninth straight Gold Glove, AND topped the O's in base hits (154). Frank Robinson (15 homers, 52 RBI) scored the most runs (69). As a team, Baltimore was eighth in the league with a .225 batting average and second after hitting 133 homers... The pitching staff put up a league best 2.66 ERA (tie with Cleveland). Dave McNally led the hurlers with 22 wins and 202 strikeouts. Jim Hardin was an 18-game winner while Tom Phoebus was the victor in fifteen. Absent was Jim Palmer who dealt with a sore arm in '67 and then had surgery on the same arm which wiped out the entire '68 campaign for him. He'd be back with a bang in '69... At the All Star recess, Hank Bauer was released from his managerial job with a 43-37 record. The "brass" felt the team was under-achieving. Enter ultra-high-energy Earl Sidney Weaver (Bauer's first base coach) who led the ball club to a 48-34 mark the rest of the way and would do nothing but WIN a ton of ballgames through 1982.
