For the season, the Dodgers hit .230 and 67 homers. Len Gabrielson was the leader with TEN home runs. He had 35 RBI. Lefty hitting catcher Tom Haller led the ball club with 53 runs batted in on the strength of only four dingers. Willie Davis ended the year with seven homers and 31 RBI but led the team in hits (161) and runs scored (86)...The Dodgers' pitching was led by Don Drysdale with fourteen wins and eight shutouts. He rang-up 155 strikeouts. Bill Singer ended the year 13-17 and topped the staff with 227 K's. Claude Osteen won twelve and lost eighteen while Don Sutton was 11-15 for the season. Drysdale and Singer both had 12 complete games. Reliever Jim Brewer whiffed 75 batters. The Dodger staff was second in the N.L. with a 2.69 ERA and allowed the fewest homers (65)...L. A. closed the year in a tie with the Phillies 21 games behind pennant-winning St. Louis. They finished just ahead of the Mets and Astros....The '68 campaign was called "The Year of the Pitcher." Earned run averages as well as batting averages had been going down for several years and the '68 season was the breaking point in major league baseball. For 1969, the slope of the pitching mound was lowered to give hurlers less of an advantage...First baseman Wes Parker was a Gold Glove recipient.
