The 1968 Yankees became a ball club that no one would remember--unless, of course, you're the most diehard fan of "The Bronx Bombers". What IS notable from this season: the Yankees finished a campaign OVER .500 for the first time since 1964, the last time they had reached the World Series. They also set the record for the LOWEST team batting average in major league baseball during the "live ball" era (.214). Go figure. The once powerful Yankees?! On top of all that, "The Commerce Comet" from Commerce, Oklahoma, Mickey Mantle, called it a career after battling pain from two dead legs for years. His career began in 1951 and it's very sad he sustained his first injury to a knee after stepping awkwardly on the cover of a recessed water drain pipe in the outfield during the World Series that October. Arguably the greatest player of all-time, certainly the greatest switch-hitter, Mantle hit 18 home runs and drove home 54 during his excruciating exit. As a major league icon, "The Mick" hit .298 and 536 home runs. A twenty-time All Star, Mantle also picked up THREE A. L. MVP Awards... Mantle, fittingly, led the Yanks in home runs in '68. An all-around solid ballplayer, Roy White, was the leader with 62 RBI, 154 base hits, and 89 runs scored. He also popped 17 homers. As a ball club, the Yankees hit 109 home runs...A total of 50 victories on the pitching mound came from three hurlers: Mel Stottlemyre (21), A. L. Rookie of the Year Stan Bahnsen (17), and southpaw "Fritz" Peterson (12). Stottlemyre was tops with 19 complete games and six shutouts. Bahnsen's 162 strikeouts were the most on the pitching staff. Yankee pitchers ended the year with a 2.79 ERA...New York finished the season 20 games in back of A. L. Champ Detroit.
