"The Little General," Gene Mauch, the Phillies' manager since 1960 who had re-stored some respectability to a down-trodden organization, was fired June 14<sup>th</sup>. The fans--those who bothered to show up--lustily booed the team's best ball player, Dick Allen, whom the press derisively called "Richie" even though Allen had said he preferred to be addressed as Dick. The fans--and the press--ALWAYS expected MORE from Allen. When he walloped tape-measure home runs, they loved and wrote great things about him. When they felt he didn't produce enough, he heard and read all about it. Catcher and team leader Clay Dalrymple, a Phillie since 1960, asked to be traded after finally becoming fed up with fans and the press regularly beating down the team. He was sent to Baltimore--a top notch franchise--after the season...The Phils hit .233 and were fourth in the N.L. with 100 home runs. Dick Allen had a monster season by hitting 33 of those homers, driving in 90 runs and crossing the plate 87 times. His purported 40 ounce bats and powerful, muscular physique made spectators stop to intently look for his next long shot when he stepped to the plate...Second baseman "Cookie" Rojas led the ball club in hits (145) and was second to Allen in runs batted in (48)...Lefty Chris Short, another long-time Phillie, was the pitching staff's leader with a 19-13 record and 202 strikeouts. Larry Jackson was 13-17 with twelve complete games; "Woodie" Fryman won twelve, completed ten, and led the staff with five shutouts. He had 151 K's. The Phillies ended the year with a 3.36 ERA, eighth in the league...The Phils and Dodgers tied for seventh place, 21 games behind the pennant-winning Cardinals...Attendance at Connie Mack Stadium was dead last, just under 665,000, in a pit of a ball park in a quickly deteriorating part of the city...Cuban native "Cookie" Rojas' real name is Octavio...Former Cardinal first baseman, Bill White, now thirty-four, contributed nine home runs and 40 RBI...Managers' records: Mauch (27-27), Myatt (1-0), Skinner (48-59).
