Shortstop Ron Hansen completed the eighth unassisted triple play in major league history, July 30th, at Cleveland. With base runners on first and second, he snared a line drive from Joe Azcue just behind second base, touched that base for out number two and then tagged out Russ Snyder who was run down by Hansen in Snyder's frantic attempt to get back to first base. The Indians won the game, 10-1, in front of just under 6,000 spectators...

For the season, the Senators hit .224 and 124 home runs. Big Frank Howard (aka "The Capital Punisher") led the American League with 44 homers and the Solons with 106 RBI, 164 hits and 79 runs scored. Howard, who was a very gentle person, at one time was well on a pace to break Babe Ruth's home run record for a season. Ken McMullen followed with 20 dingers and 62 runs batted in...The pitching staff was LAST in the A.L. with an ERA of 3.64. Camilo Pascual was the leader of the staff with 13 wins. He struck out 111 batters. Joe Coleman (12-16 W/L record) was tops with 139 K's. Jim Hannan won ten games and Frank Bertaina seven...The Senators were LAST in attendance (546,661) and LAST in the standings 37 ½ games out of first place. They were 8-10 against World Series champ Detroit during the regular season; 4-14 versus both the Orioles and Yankees. They won series against the Indians (10-7) and Oakland (11-7).
