Montreal's sophomore season resulted in an improvement of twenty-one wins over the '69 campaign... "Rusty" Staub, admired throughout Canada as LES EXPOS' best player, led the team with 30 home runs, 94 RBI, 156 base hits and 98 runs scored for the year. Bob "Beetles" Bailey hit 28 homers, drove home 84 runs and finished second to Staub by crossing the plate 77 times. Catcher John Bateman, who enjoyed hanging out with firefighters at their fire stations, had a solid offensive season with 15 dingers and 68 RBI. He was second on the ball club in hits (123) and played in 139 games. First baseman Ron Fairly also hit 19 home runs and drove in sixty-one. Outfielder Mack Jones added fourteen round-trippers. The Expos hit .237 for the season (LAST in the N.L.) and finished sixth with 136 home runs...Staff ace Carl Morton was an 18-game winner with 154 strikeouts and a team leading ten complete games including four shutouts. Bill Stoneman (7-15) was the leader of the pitching staff with 176 K's. Steve Renko was 13-11 and struck out 142 batters. Closer Claude "Frenchy" Raymond, a native Canadian, had 68 K's. Reliever John Strohmayr ended the season with 74 strikeouts. Spot starter and lefthander Dan McGinn started nineteen contests and won seven games. The staff ERA was 4.50 to end the year...Montreal was 16 games behind the NL East champion Pirates, a half-game in back of the fifth place Phillies and eleven games below the second place Cubs.
