The Dodgers opened the new "Dodger Stadium" on April 10th in Chavez Ravine. To this day it is still one of the jewels of all the ball parks in major league baseball...The '62 season ended with the Dodgers and Giants in a tie for first place. The result called for a three-game playoff between the two which the Giants won, two games to one, to advance to the World Series opposite the Yankees...The Giants won Game One at Candlestick Park, 8-0. The scene switched to brand new Dodger Stadium for the last two games. The Dodgers took Game Two, 8-7, to break a 35-inning scoreless streak. San Francisco won the finale, 6-4, the difference being a four-run top of the ninth the Dodgers could not answer...

Tommy Davis set Dodger team records with 230 hits and 153 runs batted in. Somehow, he finished THIRD in N.L. MVP voting. **Big Frank Howard** was the team leader with 31 homers. Along with his major league leading RBI total, Davis slugged 27 home runs and scored 120 runs. Howard had 119 RBI. Maury Wills set the all-time major league record for stolen bases in a season and scored 130 runs. Willie Davis, one of the best centerfielders in the game, slugged 21 homers, scored 103 times, and drove home eighty-five. The Dodgers hit .265 and 140 home runs. Their 1,510 hits placed them **FOURTH** in the league...Don Drysdale led the pitching staff with a 25-9 record, 232 strikeouts, and 19 complete games. "Sandy Koufax" was 14-7 and struck out 216 batters. Long-time Dodger Johnny Podres won fifteen games with 178 K's and Stan Williams won fourteen. The staff had a 3.62 ERA and led the N.L. with 1,104 strikeouts...The career of "The Duke of Flatbush"/"The Silver Fox," "Duke" Snider, was beginning to wind down. He played in 80 games for the season and hit five home runs while driving home thirty. His HOF performance on the field ended in '64 with the long-time rival Giants. Snider would later be heard as an analyst on TV and radio for the San Diego Padres (1969-1971) and Montreal Expos (1973-1986). His mellow, low-key commentary style made him very popular.
