The Dodgers knocked off the Pirates in the NLCS in four games, but the Oakland A's, in the midst of their mini-dynasty in the early '70s, beat the Dodgers in the World Series in five games...Andy Messersmith won twenty games for L.A. to lead the staff--including 13 complete games. Closer/kinesiologist (and general oddball) Mike Marshall saved 21 games, won 15, and finished 83 contests out of the bullpen. He set a major league record pitching 106 games in relief. His games finished and saved totals led the National League... Steve Garvey was the '74 National League Most Valuable Player and All Star Game MVP who was a "write in" starter after being left off the fan ballot. The '74 season propelled him into super-star status. He seemed to be the "All American" guy with a beautiful wife and family--the idyllic couple who led a life anyone would envy. (It didn't end that way after Garvey admitted to having an extra-marital affair(s) later in his career.)

Team leaders: Jimmy Wynn (32 homers, 108 RBI, 104 runs scored); Steve Garvey (21 home runs, 111 RBI, 200 base hits, 32 doubles); Andy Messersmith (221 strikeouts). Ron Cey belted 18 homers and drove home ninety-seven. In primarily a reserve/utility role, Joe Ferguson hit 16 home runs. Don Sutton was 19-9 with 179 strikeouts and five shutouts. Lefties Tommy John and Doug Rau each won 13 ballgames...The Dodgers led the N.L. in home runs (139), runs scored (798), and were second in the league in hitting with a .272 average. The hurlers turned in the best ERA at 2.97 for the year...The Dodgers outdistanced the second place Reds by four games in the NL West and WON the season series, 12-6...L.A. was 4-8 versus Pittsburgh in the regular season. They dominated the lowly Padres by winning sixteen games and dropping only two.
