The Tigers had lost an American League record 119 games just three years before, but under the direction of skipper Jim Leyland, a sure Hall of Fame manager, a new era had begun. The so-called "experts" did not give the Tigers much of a chance to contend for the AL Central title, but some underachieving players matured and a young pitching staff--which would lead the majors in ERA--evolved into a first-class group. Detroit got off to a sluggish start, 7-6 on April 17th, before Leyland lit into his team for less-than-inspiring play. Leyland's loud locker room chastising of his ball club at that point turned on the lights in Tiger Town. When the calendar showed May 21st, the Tigers were 29-14 and had completed a 28-7 run that propelled them into sole possession of first place, a spot they held until September 27th. Now tied with Minnesota, Leyland's ball club lost the season's final three games to lowly Kansas City while the Twins, who won ONE of their last three, leap-frogged into first place...Detroit boasted FOUR players with at least 24 homers: Craig Monroe (28), Brandon Inge (27), Marcus Thames (26), and Magglio Ordonez (24). Ordonez was also the team leader with 104 RBI and 177 base hits. Carlos Guillen's 100 runs scored topped the ball club. He provided a powerful stick as well with 174 base hits, 19 home runs, 41 doubles, and 85 RBI. For the year, the Tigers hit .274 and 203 homers, the latter third-most in the league...Veteran Kenny Rogers, 41, and A. L. Rookie of the Year Justin Verlander both won 17 games to lead the pitching corps. Two members of that 2003 Detroit team which set the A. L. record for futility, Jeremy Bonderman and Nate Robertson, won 14 and 13 games, respectively. Bonderman's 202 strikeouts led the staff; Robertson followed with one hundred thirty-seven. Verlander posted 124 K's. Closer Todd Jones, 38, received high praise from Leyland for his consistently good, dependable work out of the bullpen all season long. The staff ended the year with a 3.84 ERA...Detroit, the A. L. Wild Card team, knocked off the favored Yankees in the ALDS, 3-1, before eliminating the Oakland A's in the ALCS, 4-0. The World Series was a big disappointment to Tigers fans who had waited for a playoff team since 1987. Detroit and the St. Louis Cardinals split the first two games in Detroit, then the Cards won the next three at Busch Stadium. Verlander was the losing pitcher in Game Five, 4-2. The Tigers hit .199 to The Redbirds .228 in the Series; St. Louis outscored Detroit, 22-11.
