The Phillies opened the brand new Veterans Stadium, April 10<sup>th</sup>, with a win against the Expos, 4-1, and the introduction of one Harry Kalas--a new broadcaster who doubled as the Master of Ceremonies that day...Rick Wise no-hit the Reds June 23<sup>rd</sup> in Cincinnati. He hit TWO home runs as well. The clouts came off Ross Grimsley in the fifth inning and Clay Carroll in the eighth--both to left field. A sixth inning walk spoiled a perfect game...Mike Schmidt was taken in the second round of the amateur draft and played the season with the Reading Phillies (AA) primarily as a shortstop...Willie Stargell of Pittsburgh hit the longest home run in the Vet's history only three months after it opened. The location where the ball landed in the upper deck of right field remained marked with a yellow star and black "S" to note Stargell's blast until the stadium was demolished in 2004. (The ball came down in the ball park's 601 section and landed in an EXIT portal before it rolled into a concourse.)...Deron Johnson topped the Phils with 34 home runs and 95 RBI. Willie Montanez hit 30 homers, drove in 99 runs, and led the team with 78 runs scored. Shortstop Larry Bowa topped the ball club with 162 hits. He scored 74 times. The Phillies ended the year eleventh in the N.L. in batting (.233) and sixth in homers (123). Wise had six dingers and 15 RBI...Rick Wise also led the pitching staff with a 17-14 won/loss record, 155 strikeouts, 17 complete games, and four shutouts. Spot-starter "Woodie" Fryman won 10 games and struck out 104 batters. Chris Short was 7-14 for the season while striking out ninety-five. Darrell Brandon won six contests out of the bullpen. The staff ERA was ninth in the league (3.71)...At one point, the Phils were 30 games under .500 and at the most 31 games behind the division leader. Philadelphia did not win a SINGLE season series. They did split with the Giants, 6-6.
