*The White Sox captured their first AL Central title since their World Championship season of 2005. However, it took a one-game playoff with the Twins to clinch the division crown, a 1-0 win at U.S. Cellular Field...Newcomer Carlos Quentin was everything the Sox had hoped for after leading the ball club with 36 home runs and 100 runs driven in. He tied rightfielder Jermaine Dye for the team lead with 96 runs scored. Dye followed with 34 dingers and 96 runs batted in and had a team high 41 doubles for the season. Shortstop Orlando Cabrera, acquired from the Angels in the off-season, topped the White Sox with 186 base hits. He scored 93 runs and stroked 33 doubles. His veteran presence and outstanding fielding were a priceless addition. Chicago led the American League with 235 homers. DH Jim Thome (34), Nick Swisher (24), Paul Konerko (22), and rookie Alexei Ramirez (21) contributed to that total. The Sox placed eleventh in the league with a .263 batting average...Gavin Floyd won seventeen games to lead the pitching staff. He came within two outs of a no-hitter on May 6<sup>th</sup> against Minnesota. A double by Joe Mauer ruined the "no-no" in the ninth inning, a 6-1 win for the Sox who had given up an unearned run in the fourth. Southpaw Mark Buehrle won fifteen ball games while Javier Vazquez and John Danks both were twelve-game winners. Vazquez topped the staff with 200 strikeouts. Danks struck out 159 to finish second. The staff ERA (4.06) ranked them sixth in the A.L...On August 14<sup>th</sup> at Kansas City, Thome, Konerko, Ramirez, and Juan Uribe hit consecutive home runs in back-to-back fashion during the sixth inning, a first in franchise history. Chicago won the ball game, 9-2...The White Sox faced Tampa Bay in the ALDS with the Rays taking the first two games at Tropicana Field. Chicago won Game Three back home, 5-3, behind Danks. With Sox fans, most of whom wearing as much black as they could for a "black out" game (a late-season tradition which had started with the division tie-breaker against Minnesota), Chicago lost Game Four, 6-2, clinching the series for the Rays, three games to one.*
