Offensively, Vlad Guerrero led the Angels with 27 home runs, 91 RBI, and 164 base hits. He tied Torii Hunter for the team lead in runs scored (85). One of the best outfielders in the game, Hunter clobbered 21 dingers, drove in 78 for the year, and topped the ball club with 37 doubles. Garret Anderson (15 homers) was second on the team with 84 RBI. Slugger Mike Napoli bashed twenty home runs in just 227 at bats. First-sacker Mark Teixeira was a mid-season acquisition from Atlanta. His potent bat (13 home runs, 43 RBI) and Gold Glove-style defense was a vital part of the Angels run to the AL West crown by 21 games over Texas. As a team, The Halos hit .268 (seventh in the A. L.) and 159 home runs (ninth in the league). They were second with 129 stolen bases...The pitching staff posted the third best ERA (3.99). Lefty Joe Saunders finished the season with 17 wins and only seven setbacks while staff ace Ervin Santana wrapped up the year 16-7 with a staff-leading 214 strikeouts. Jon Garland won fourteen ball games; right behind was John Lackey with twelve victories and Jered Weaver (152 K's) who posted eleven wins. On September 13<sup>th</sup>, closer Frankie Rodriguez broke the major league record with his 58<sup>th</sup> save and ended the year with a major league high sixty-two. "K-Rod" rang up 77 strikeout victims. The Angels staff totaled 66 saves...After posting the most wins for a season in team history, the Angels were bounced once again from the playoffs by the Red Sox in the ALDS, three games to one. Boston had done the same in 2004 and 2007 as well as the 1986 ALCS, one of the most exciting post-season series in history...The Angels had WON the regular season match-ups in '08, eight games to one.
