The “Metsies” (as Keith Hernandez likes to call them) had a seven game lead in the NL East on September 12th. They then lost 12 of their last 17 games to relinquish that lead to the Phillies and miss the playoffs. It is considered one of the worst collapses in baseball history by a team that had once held first place and was expected to win... David Wright had a marvelous season with 30 homers, 42 doubles, 113 runs scored, 196 hits, 107 RBI and a Gold Glove Award at third base. Carlos Beltran led the ball club with 33 home runs and 112 RBI. Carlos Delgado added 24 home runs and 87 RBI. The Mets were second in the N.L. with a .275 batting average and fifth with 177 home runs for the year. What’s more, they led the majors in stolen bases (200)...John Maine and Oliver Perez both led the pitching staff with 15-10 won/loss records. Maine was the strikeout leader with 180 K’s. Perez had 174 punch outs. Tom Glavine posted a 13-8 record while 41-year old Orlando Hernandez was nine and five. Closer Billy Wagner whiffed 80 batters. The staff ERA was 4.26 (7th)...On September 30th, Glavine gave up seven runs in the first inning of an 8-1 loss to the Marlins at Shea Stadium. The Phillies beat the Nationals to win the NL East Division. A Mets win would have forced a one-game playoff with the Phillies for the division title.
