"The Big Red Machine" is still a powerful conglomerate with their 2 ½ game finish behind the Dodgers in the NL West as testimony, but the ball club is aging quickly and has begun a transition to a different mix... "Father Time" hasn't taken hold of one Peter Edward Rose just yet. Rose, 37, tied "Wee Willie" Keeler's National League record with a 44-game hitting streak which began June 14th and ended August 1st. The Braves' Gene Garber struck out Rose in the ninth inning of the game in which the streak ended leaving Rose to make some "sour grapes" comments afterwards. Rose felt the opposition had treated the confrontation "like the ninth inning of the seventh game of the World Series." Earlier, on May 5th, Rose picked up career hit #3,000 off the Expos' Steve Rogers which made Pete the 13th and youngest player in major league history to reach that mark...Tom Seaver, in his first full season in a Reds' uniform, earned his first and only career no-hitter against the Cardinals at Riverfront Stadium, June 16th. During the "no-no," Seaver walked three and struck out three in the 4-0 contest...Rose led the Reds with 198 base hits and 103 runs scored. George Foster, coming off a 52-home run campaign in '77, blasted 40 round-trippers in '78 to lead the ball club to go with 120 RBI. Johnny Bench, now thirty years old, hit 23 homers to finish second to Foster. Joe Morgan, 34, played in 132 games with 441 at bats for the year. He hit 13 home runs and drove in seventy-five. As a team, the Reds hit .256 and 136 home runs...Seaver was the staff ace with a 16-14 won/loss record and 226 strikeouts. He had eight complete games. Lefty Fred Norman and righty Bill Bonham both were winners eleven times. The staff's ERA (3.81) placed them ninth in the N.L... "Sparky" Anderson was let go as manager after the season and Rose would go on to sign as a free-agent with the Phillies for 1979...The Reds and Dodgers split their season's meetings, 9-9.
