The team which has worn the Olde English "D" on their uniform jerseys since its earliest days batted .260 for the season and hit 183 home runs. Miguel Cabrera, who finished fourth in the A. L. in batting average (eighth in the majors), topped the ball club in most offensive categories: Home runs (34), RBI (103), base hits (198), and runs scored (96). Curtis Granderson popped 30 round-trippers while Brandon Inge poked 27 homers and was second with 84 RBI...Justin Verlander, third in league Cy Young Award voting, led the pitching corps in wins (19) and strikeouts (269). Rick Porcello won 14 games and Edwin Jackson was the victor 13 times. The staff's ERA finished the year at 4.29 (league rank: fifth)...From May 10<sup>th</sup> through October 4<sup>th</sup>, Detroit was alone in first place of the AL Central or tied for the top spot (8 times). The Twins were deadlocked with the Tigers after Game 162 forcing a one-game playoff at Minnesota, October 6<sup>th</sup>, a game the Twins won 6-5 in twelve innings and the division crown...The Tigers thus became the first team in MLB history to lose a three-game lead with four left to play...Boston was the A. L.'s Wild Card team for the post-season.
