The Braves managed to win another NL West title after trailing the Giants for most of the season. On August 11th, San Francisco led Atlanta by nine games before the Giants went into a 12-18 tailspin and relinquished their advantage. (Over those same thirty games on the schedule, the Braves would go 24-6 and would hold the lead for the remainder of the year.) A Dodger victory over the Giants (who finished with 103 wins) the last day of the regular season clinched the division for Atlanta...David Justice led the ball club with 40 homers and 120 RBI. Ron Gant (36 home runs) topped the Braves with 117 RBI and 113 runs scored. Jeff Blauser had a team high 182 base hits. On July 18th, Fred McGriff was acquired in a trade with San Diego and added an important--and very impressive--19 dingers and 55 RBI in 68 ball games. His first game, July 20th, was delayed by a fire in "press level" of Fulton County Stadium. The time needed to douse the flames allowed "Crime Dog" to arrive at the ball park, suit up, and start the game at first base. He hit a two-run homer in the sixth inning to erase a five-run Cardinal's lead in a game the Braves would win, 8-5...December 9, 1992 is another day in Braves history that will long be remembered: Greg Maddux, a free agent and former Cub, signed a contract with Atlanta which would lift the team and his career to lofty heights. Maddux would win 194 games in a Braves uniform, twenty that first season. Lefty Tom Glavine went 22-6 while Steve Avery won eighteen games and John Smoltz fifteen. The pitching staff led the majors in ERA (3.14) and the fewest runs allowed (559)...In the batters box, the Braves were ninth in the N.L. with a .262 batting average but first in home runs (169)...The two-time defending National League champions were bested by the gritty Phillies in six games in the NLCS even though the series' stats show Atlanta out-scored, out-hit, and out-pitched the Phils "Macho Row" ball club. Philadelphia's timely hitting and the Braves inexplicably silent bats in the last three games cost the latter team the series.
