The Rangers' '93 campaign was NOT without its highlights: Nolan Ryan had announced he would retire after the season prior to Opening Day. At forty-six, "The Express" struck out 46 batters and was 5-5 for the year before tearing an elbow ligament in his throwing arm September 22nd during a game in Seattle. He attempted one more pitch in the game—a 98 mph fastball—before determining he would not be able to continue. The injury ended his career two starts earlier than planned. On August 4th he hit Robin Ventura of the White Sox with a pitch which led to an on-field brawl after Ventura charged the mound. Ryan placed Ventura, 26, in a headlock before a teammate separated the combatants. Ryan said it was a move he uses to wrestle steers on his Texas ranch...In Cleveland May 26th, Jose Canseco lost a fly ball in the lights which resulted in the ball bouncing off the top of his head and over the fence for a home run. Three days later, Canseco volunteered to pitch the eighth inning in a blow-out loss to the Red Sox. He wrecked the elbow in his right arm during the stint and was lost for the remainder of the season...The Rangers hit .267 and 181 home runs, the latter the most in the A. L...Team leaders: Juan Gonzalez (46 homers, 118 RBI); Rafael Palmeiro (37 home runs, 105 RBI, 176 base hits, 124 runs scored); starter Kenny Rogers (16 wins, 140 strikeouts); and Kevin Brown (15 wins, 142 K's, 12 complete games, three shutouts). Roger Pavlik won twelve ball games. The pitching staff's ERA was sixth in the league (4.28)...Texas played .500 ball (26-26) versus teams in the AL West.
