The Dodgers had come off TWO World Series titles but had no idea what was in store for the '67 season...The ball club was not too surprised by the retirement of Sandy Koufax who decided to end his career due to a very painful arthritic throwing elbow...The Dodgers hit .236 and 82 homers for the year partly because of an injury to outfielder Lou Johnson and two off-season trades that didn't work out. Johnson, one of the team's best hitters and baserunners, missed two months of the season with a knee injury. Trades which sent shortstop Maury Wills to the Pirates and Tommy Davis to the Mets brought returns which didn't come near to matching that pair's output from '66. What's more, players such as Wes Parker, Ron Fairly, and Willie Davis didn't produce nearly the same numbers in '67 as they had in the past. Al Ferrara led the ball club with 16 homers and 50 RBI; Fairly topped the team with 55 runs batted in to go with ten home runs; and Johnson ended the season with 11 dingers and 41 RBI. Willie Davis had the most hits (146) and runs scored (65). Wes Parker won a Gold Glove. L. A. scored 519 runs...Dodger pitching was very good as usual: a 3.21 ERA (fifth in the N.L.) and the fewest bases on balls allowed (393). Claude Osteen was the staff's top winner with 17 victories while Don Drysdale was 13-16 and led the staff with 196 strikeouts. Osteen tallied 152 K's and was the staff's leader with 14 complete games and five shutouts. The tall and hard-throwing Bill Singer went 12-8; young righthander Don Sutton was 11-15 for the year. Both pitchers struck out 169 batters...The Dodgers finished the season 28 ½ games behind the pennant winning Cardinals and were a horrendous 31-50 on the road. They finished ahead of only the Astros and Mets and never got closer than seven games to first place. In the season series with the Giants, the Dodgers were 5-13. Attendance was just over 1.66 million, second in the league.
