The Senators played eighteen extra-inning games, two of which went 20 innings or more. The first went six hours and eight minutes, June 12<sup>th</sup>, until Paul Casanova hit a bases-loaded single to leftfield, driving in "Cap" Peterson in the bottom of the 22<sup>nd</sup> inning. Washington had filled the sacks with a walk, a single, and an intentional walk prior to Casanova's game-winning RBI for a 6-5 victory over the White Sox. The game had started with just over 7,000 in attendance. The second was a 20-inning affair lasting five hours, forty minutes at Minnesota, August 9<sup>th</sup>. In the top of the inning, the Solons scored on a homer by Ken McMullen and sacrifice fly from Dick Nen to take a 9-7 lead. The Twins got a lead-off single in the last of the twentieth before being retired 1-2-3. That win put the Senators at .500 for the season. Their high-mark was two games over .500, May 8<sup>th</sup>...Six foot seven Frank Howard hit 36 of Washington's 115 home runs. He also led the team in RBI (89). McMullen (16 HR) had the most base hits (138) and runs scored (73). He knocked in 67. The ballclub hit to the tune of .223, last in the A. L...Camilo Pascual's 12 wins topped the pitching staff followed by Phil Ortega's ten. Ortega collected the most strikeouts (122). Twenty-year-old Joe Coleman won eight ballgames. The Solons finished with a 3.38 ERA, ninth in the league...Gil Hodges left to manage the Mets after the season. He departed with a record of 321-444 (.420) in five years and guided the team to its best-ever finish in 1967.
