For the Tigers, who spent as many as 41 calendar days tied or in sole possession of first place, the season came down to its very two last games to decide an American League champion. One of the most exciting pennant races in baseball history was waged during the Summer with four ballclubs: Detroit, Chicago, Boston, and Minnesota jockeying for position atop the standings. (The Tigers biggest lead had been two games, June 6th.) On the regular season's final morning, the Tigers were a half-game out and scheduled to play a doubleheader with California at Tiger Stadium. In Boston, the Red Sox won 5-3 to eliminate the Twins; in Detroit, the Tigers and Angels split the twin-bill giving the Red Sox the pennant...The Tigers were well-balanced with their offense and pitching. They were ranked second in the league in both batting average (.243) and homers (152) while the staff closed the year sixth with a 3.32 ERA. The four-man rotation won 69 ballgames, 76% of the team's victories. Earl Wilson's 22 wins topped the major leagues; his 184 strikeouts were the most on the staff along with his 12 complete games. Denny McLain won seventeen, Joe Sparma sixteen, and Mickey Lolich fourteen. The trio of McLain, Sparma, and Lolich ranged in age from 23 to 25...Al Kaline, 32, hit 25 homers to lead the team. Norm Cash, 33, and Dick McAuliffe, 27, both swatted twenty-two. Kaline collected the most RBI (78) and runs scored (94). Catcher Bill Freehan, 25, stroked 146 base hits to pace the team. Tiger hitters served like carnival-game targets during the season while opposing pitchers rang up a major league-high 51 hit batters. An excellent hitter for a pitcher AND with some power, the 6' 3" Wilson clubbed four home runs and knocked in fifteen.
