One can easily argue the Expos were the BEST team in baseball in 1994. They finished with the major leagues' best record and winning percentage (.694), ahead of the Yankees, Braves, and White Sox, in that order. This ballclub was loaded with a very talented young bunch of players who were rapidly gaining confidence and a high-level of ability to beat any team, any time...Montreal came out-of-the-gate with a slow start (they were fifth in the NL East and six games behind April 21st), but their rapid rise commenced the next day with a 9-8 victory at Los Angeles. They took a foothold of second place May 11th behind Atlanta and remained there until July 7th when the Expos knocked-off the Padres in San Diego and tied the Braves for first. The ballclub temporarily moved into sole possession of first July 10th following a four-game weekend sweep of the Padres. On July 16th, the Expos slipped to second, but regained the top spot for what was left of the season July 22nd after defeating the Dodgers in Montreal, 8-2. A 19-3 spurt, from July 23rd until the '94 season was curtailed August 11th with a players' strike, locked the Expos into first place with a six-game advantage over Atlanta. The season's head-to-head meetings with the Braves ended in Montreal's favor, 5-4...The ballclub was number two in the N. L. after finishing with a .278 team batting average. They were second with 246 doubles, but only ninth with 108 home runs. Larry Walker tied Houston's Craig Biggio with a major league-high 44 two-baggers. Marquis Grissom's 96 runs scored were second in the big leagues while his 36 stolen bases were fourth. The Expos had the most stolen bases in the N. L. (137). Moises Alou led the team with 22 jacks and 143 base hits. His 78 RBI were second to Walker's 86. Walker clobbered 19 home runs, Wil Cordero 15. Alou and Walker finished the year in the top eight of the majors in batting average...Expos pitching was as good as the Braves: 3.56 ERA (1st); saves (46, 1st); fewest walks allowed (288, 1st); strikeouts (805, 3rd); and fewest runs allowed (454, 2nd). Ken Hill's 16 wins were the most on the pitching staff. He lost only five. Twenty-two-year-old Pedro Martinez (11-5) racked-up the most strikeouts (142) and took a perfect-game into the eighth inning, April 13th, until he hit the Reds Reggie Sanders with a brushback pitch, leading to a bench-clearing brouhaha and Sanders charging the mound. Martinez gave up a lead-off hit with no one out in the top of the ninth. He would get a no-decision in a game the Expos won, 3-2, in the ninth with two out.
