The 1964 season was one which doesn't seem to come around often enough, but perhaps it's good it doesn't. There were FIVE ballclubs in the eight team National League which had a legitimate shot at winning the pennant. The Phillies maintained first place practically the entire season and held a 5 ½ game lead over the Reds as the calendar flipped to September. Then the wheels of the Phillies pennant-express nearly disintegrated. Beginning on September 21st at Crosley Field, the Redlegs swept Philadelphia in a three-game series to cut their advantage to 3 ½ games. The Phillies lost their next seven games as well to relinquish the lead which allowed the Reds and Cardinals to battle for the flag. While Cincinnati was 6-4 in the last ten games, St. Louis jumped ahead by going 8-2 to capture the pennant. The Reds finished one game behind tied with the Phils...After being diagnosed with lung cancer, manager Fred Hutchinson left the ballclub in August with the team holding a 60-49 record. Dick Sisler stepped in to finish the year as interim skipper, guiding the team to a 32-21 mark. "Hutch" officially resigned his post in October and passed away in November...Twenty-eight-year-old Frank Robinson paced the ballclub after hitting 29 homers and driving home 96 runs while compiling a .943 OPS. Vada Pinson's bat produced 23 home runs, 84 RBI, 11 triples, and 23 doubles. Deron Johnson, 25, added 21 jacks and 79 ribbies. The Reds were seventh in the N. L. in batting average (.249) and fourth in home runs (149)...Reds pitching was outstanding. The staff was second in ERA (3.07), second in complete games (54), allowed the fewest runs (566), and topped the N. L. with 1,122 strikeouts. At the top of the list was Jim O'Toole's 17 wins. He was followed by Jim Maloney's 15 victories and staff-leading 214 strikeouts. Veterans Bob Purkey and Joey Jay both won eleven. Closer Sammy Ellis whiffed 125 batters.
