The Yankees and Dodgers split the first two games at Yankee Stadium with 1-0 scores. Tommy Henrich, "Old Reliable," won Game One with a walk-off homer. "The Bronx Bombers" would take the last three games, all at Ebbets Field, to win the '49 Fall Classic, four games to one. This series victory launched the Yanks to a streak of five straight World Championships--four at the Dodgers expense. No fewer than ten future Hall of Famer's participated in the '49 Series--nine players and one umpire. Bobby Brown hit .500 in The Series (six for twelve)... "The Yankee Clipper," Joe DiMaggio, suffered with a very sore heel for most of the season. He hit only .111 in the World Series... When the "old guard" Yankee veterans found out Casey Stengel would be the manager in '49, they quickly became concerned. Casey was considered a "clown", Spring Training wasn't going very well, but "Ol' Case" took command... Tommy Henrich, one of the "old guard," later exclaimed "there was no clowning around." Henrich led the Yankees with 24 homers. Yogi Berra hit 20 home runs and led the ball club with 91 RBI. Henrich was next with eighty-five. DiMaggio would slam 14 homers and drive in sixty-seven. The Yanks hit .269 for the season and were third in the A.L. with 115 home runs... Vic Raschi led the pitching staff by posting a 21-10 W/L record and 21 complete games. Allie Reynolds was 17-6 for the year while Eddie Lopat and Tommy Byrne both won fifteen games. Byrne led the staff with 129 strikeouts. Reliever Joe Page led the majors with 27 saves, games pitched, and games finished (48). The staff ERA (3.69) was second in the league.
