The stars were aligned for the Astros in 2005 as they reached the World Series for the first time in franchise history. It turned out to be a season in which they chased but could never quite run down NL Central champ St. Louis. Houston limped out of the starting blocks 15-30 to open the campaign, but beginning July 20th, reeled off 42 wins in the last 69 games to earn the NL Wild Card. The Braves were knocked off, 3-1, in the NLDS; then it took six games to eliminate the Cardinals in the NLCS. The team came down-to-earth in the Fall Classic: the Chicago White Sox out-scored the Astros, 20-14, in their four-game sweep; out-hit the NL champs, 44-29 (.286 to .203); and out-slugged the team from Texas, six home runs to three...Morgan Ensberg's 36 HR and 101 RBI were the best on the ballclub. Craig Biggio, 39, clubbed 26 jacks and led the team with 94 runs. Jason Lane added 26 homers while Willy Taveras rang-up the most hits (172). Jeff Bagwell, 37, hit three home runs, drove home 19, and played in just 39 games in his final season...Roy Oswalt's 20 wins led the pitching staff. Roger Clemens, 42, had the big leagues lowest ERA; finished third in Cy Young Award voting; and won 13 ballgames. He led the starters with 185 K's and a 1.008 WHIP. Andy Pettitte had a terrific season: 17 wins, only 9 losses, and 171 strikeouts...For the year, Astros hit .256 and 119 homers. The staff ERA (3.51) was .02 points behind the first place Cardinals.
