The Jays were a third or fourth place ballclub for practically the entire season. They were an even 44-44 at the All Star break, in fourth place and only 5 ½ games out of first in the AL East...Ace Roy Halladay was lost for the year on July 8th after a leg was broken by a line drive back through the box. "Doc" had posted a 12-4 W/L record, an A. L. leading five complete games, 108 K's, and a WHIP of 0.960. His strong start made him an easy selection for his third All Star Team...Both Josh Towers and Gustavo Chacin topped the pitching staff with their 13 victories; Ted Lilly was a 10-game winner. Chacin had the most punch-outs (121) while Towers collected 112. Blue Jays hurlers ended the season with a 4.06 ERA, the sixth spot in the league...The team had seven players hit at least 10 home runs: Vernon Wells (28), Shea Hillenbrand (18), Eric Hinske (15), both Gregg Zaun and Corey Koskie (11), and Alex Rios and Orlando Hudson both (10). Wells finished with the most RBI (97) followed by Hillenbrand's 82. Hinske added 68 more runs batted in. The ultra-versatile Hillenbrand held the top spot on the Jays in base hits (173), runs scored (91), and doubles (36). For the year, Toronto hit .265 as a team (ninth in the league) and 136 homers (eleventh)...The Blue Jays and Angels needed 18 innings to decide a winner, July 28th, the longest game in franchise history. Hudson hit a line-drive single to right-centerfield with one out and the Angels infield drawn in to score Alex Rios from third base. Toronto won the ballgame at the newly christened Rogers Centre (formerly SkyDome), 2-1, a contest lasting nearly five hours. A crowd of 19,706 was on hand to see both teams wrap out nine hits each; the Jays had tied the game with one out in the last of the ninth inning. Pete Walker, who pitched the last three innings for the home "nine", was the winning pitcher.
