Twenty-eight-year-old Andruw Jones capped his MVP-type season (he finished #2) with a 430 foot blast to the upper-deck in leftfield at Citizens Bank Park against the Phillies, September 15th, career home run #300. Jones led the big leagues with *51* jacks and the National League with 128 RBI. He also picked-up his eighth Gold Glove in eight seasons covering the centerfield pasture at Turner Field and finished ninth in the majors with a .575 slugging percentage. "Chipper" Jones, 33, tallied 21 home runs in 109 games played while driving home 72 baserunners. Smooth-fielding Adam LaRoche added 20 homers and 78 RBI. Rafael Furcal posted a "triple double": 31 doubles, 11 triples, and 12 home runs. His 175 base hits led the team. Marcus Giles (15 HR) scored the most runs (104). The ballclub hit a composite .265 and 184 homers...John Smoltz, 38, topped the pitching staff after collecting 169 strikeouts. He and Tim Hudson tied for the most wins (14). The staff ERA (3.98) was sixth-best in the league...The Braves raised their 11th consecutive N. L. East title flag, the last of a remarkable run under Bobby Cox, edging out the Phillies by two games for the division crown. Their biggest lead was seven games, September 11th...The Braves and Astros traded victories in the first three games of the NLDS, but Houston, on their way to the World Series, won Game Four in extra-innings at Houston, 7-6, to advance. The final game was not decided until the 18th inning, a thriller which lasted five hours and fifty minutes. The two teams had been tied since the ninth frame.
