The Padres swiped the majors' highest number of stolen bases (239), just two ahead of Montreal, while three San Diego speedsters placed in the top ten in the big leagues in steals as well, Gene Richards, Ozzie Smith, and Jerry Mumphrey. They hit the second fewest home runs of all other major league teams (67) to the Mets 61. Richards' 193 base hits were second in the N. L. to the Dodgers Steve Garvey. Dave Winfield's 20 jacks and 87 RBI led the ballclub. The Padres .255 team BA was ninth in the league... The pitching staff showed two 11-game winners for the year: spot-starter Bob Shirley and closer "Rollie" Fingers. Regular starter John Curtis won 10 ballgames. Steve Mura was the staff's strikeout leader (109). The hurlers put up a 3.65 ERA...Korean War hero and Marine Corps pilot, Jerry Coleman, who began his broadcasting career on the CBS "Game of the Week" and the Yankees for whom he played in the 50s, became an institution in the Padres' booth in 1972 through 2014. However, after the team won just 68 games in '79, Coleman was offered the job as field manager, but gave it up after one year to return to his beloved spot behind the microphone for the home "nine" as well as CBS Radio broadcasts. His voice would become easily recognizable to millions all over the world and at sea through Armed Forces Radio.
