The Blue Jays are looking like they're almost ready to leave the nest. The ballclub spent 15 days of the season alone or tied for first place of the AL East between April 25th and May 10th. From May 11th through May 30th, they were primarily in second place, but after that, the season began to slip from their grasp. Their record would be 45-75 (.375) to the end of the year. Within the division, the Jays were 28-50...There are now some home-grown baby birds beginning to appear on the roster (including 1978 first-round draft pick [2nd overall], twenty-year-old Lloyd Moseby) who would be vital cogs in the franchise's success down the road. Add to the list Garth Iorg, Danny Ainge, and Willie Upshaw along with pitchers Dave Stieb and Jim Clancy...John Mayberry, Sr. again led the team with 30 home runs and 82 RBI. Moseby, who played the most of the newcomers, cracked 9 home runs and drove in 46. Otto Velez finished second with 20 jacks. Alfredo Griffin felt no "sophomore jinx." He tied the Royals Willie Wilson for the most triples in the big leagues (15). The Blue Jays hit 126 homers and batted .251 for the season...Stieb and Clancy became the anchors of the pitching staff. Clancy led the hurlers with 13 wins, 15 complete games, and 152 strikeouts. Stieb was a 12-game winner and completed 14 games. He had the lowest WHIP among the starters: a respectable 1.298. A staff ERA of 4.19 ranked them ninth in the American League.
