J. R. Richard's wonderful career came to a tragic halt when he began feeling numbness in his throwing arm and confusing, unclear sight during a game, July 14th. Richard went on the disabled list, got checked by a physician who diagnosed the problem, but who suggested no surgery be done on a blocked arm artery. On July 30th, the big righthander was loosening-up in the outfield when he said he developed a headache, arm weakness, and later paralysis which caused him to collapse and black out. He had suffered a major stroke. After rehabilitation, Richard attempted a comeback in 1981 and again in 1982 in the minors, but by 1983 his reactions during active on-field play were deemed dangerously slow coupled with sight difficulties. He never pitched a regular season game again in the big leagues...Free agents Nolan Ryan and former Astro star Joe Morgan were signed during the off-season. Other team leaders: Terry Puhl (13 home runs, 55 RBI); Jose Cruz (11 homers, 91 RBI, 185 base hits, 79 runs scored); Joe Niekro (20 wins, 11 complete games), Ken Forsch and Vern Ruhle (both 12 victories); and Ryan (11 wins, 200 K's)...The Astros hit .261, 75 home runs, and led the majors with 67 triples. Morgan, now 36, clubbed 11 homers, tied former teammate Dan Driessen for the league lead in walks (93), and played in 141 games...The pitching corps posted the big league's best ERA (3.10) and most strikeouts (929). Ryan got his 3,000th career strike out July 4th...The Astros and Dodgers, tied for the division top-spot, played a Game #163 to determine the champion. At Dodger Stadium, October 6th, Houston knocked off L. A. by a 7-1 score behind Niekro...The Astros winged on to Philadelphia where the Phils won Game 1 of the NLCS, 3-1. A four-run tenth inning in Game 2 led to a 7-4 Astros victory in ten innings in Philly. Game 3 at the Astrodome, Houston won 1-0 in ten; then in Game 4 in Houston, the Phillies scored three in the eighth and two in the top of the tenth to throttle the home "nine," 5-3. Game 5 was a dandy: After seven innings, the Astros led the decisive game, 5-2, before the Phillies loaded the bases with none out against Ryan in the eighth. Two runs scored on a walk to Pete Rose and a groundout by Keith Moreland. Del Unser tied the game with a single followed by Manny Trillo's two-run triple to put the Phils on top, 7-5. Houston re-tied the contest in the last of the eighth, but Philadelphia

would score the winning run on doubles by Unser and Garry Maddox in the top of the tenth inning. The Astros went out 1-2-3 in the last of the tenth, winding-up a scintillating championship playoff series with an 8-7 final score.
