During Spring Training in March, manager George Bamberger was hospitalized following the diagnosis that he had suffered a heart attack after earlier being treated for back and chest pains by physicians. Third base coach "Buck" Rodgers was named the field manager to start the season and guided the ballclub to a 26-21 record before Bamberger returned to the dugout, June 4<sup>th</sup>. Bamberger resigned with a 47-45 mark on September 9<sup>th</sup> which brought about the hiring of Rodgers as skipper on a permanent basis. Under Rodgers, the team finished the season 13-10...Milwaukee ended the campaign 17 games behind the AL East champion Yankees and 14 games in back of second place Baltimore. During the regular season, the Brewers compiled an 11-15 record versus the Yanks and Orioles...Cecil Cooper, who topped the big leagues with 122 RBI, finished .038 points behind batting champion George Brett. Cooper had 25 jacks and led the team with 219 base hits. "Stormin' Gorman" Thomas was fourth overall in the majors with 38 home runs but had the dubious distinction of leading MLB in strikeouts (170). Ben Oglivie had an MVP-type year after tying Reggie Jackson in home runs (41, 2<sup>nd</sup> in MLB); 118 RBI (a tie for 3<sup>rd</sup> with Mr. Brett); slugging percentage (.563 4<sup>th</sup>); and OPS (.925 5<sup>th</sup>). Cooper produced a .926 OPS. Twenty-four-year-old Robin Yount was the major league leader in doubles (49). The ballclub hit .275 and led the A. L. with 203 home runs and 298 doubles...The pitching staff was solid as well with a 3.71 ERA (4<sup>th</sup> in the A. L.) and FOUR double-digit winners: "Moose" Haas (16), Mike Caldwell (13), and both Lary Sorensen and Bill Travers (12). Haas struck out 146 batters and completed 14 games to lead the staff...The season's high-mark was 12 games over .500 on September 20<sup>th</sup>. In April, they had spent 7 days in first place.
