"The Magic Is Back" was the marketing motto for the 1980 Mets...Following a win over the Braves in Atlanta, July 15th, the Metropolitan reached the .500 mark with a 3 1/2 game deficit from first in the NL East and positioned in fourth place. After that date, New York would end the season with a 25-53 record, including a 13-game losing skid from the end of August into mid-September...Three youngsters who would be vital cogs in the franchise's future success--"Mookie" Wilson, Wally Backman, and "Hubie" Brooks--all debuted with the big club as part of September minor league call-ups...Lee Mazzilli led the ballclub in four offensive categories: Home runs (16), RBI (76), base hits (162), and runs scored (82). Claudell Washington joined the Mets, June 7th, from the White Sox in a trade for a minor leaguer and was second with 10 jacks. As a team, New York hit .257 and finished 12th in the N. L. with 61 homers...Mark Bombback's 10 wins were the most on the pitching staff; Pete Falcone's 109 strikeouts held the top-spot; and Pat Zachry registered the most complete games (7) and shutouts (3). The staff ERA was 3.85 (9th)...On January 24th, a new ownership combination of Nelson Doubleday, Jr. and Fred Wilpon purchased the team from the Payson family for around \$22 million. Both promised to invest more money to up-grade the product on the field; the Mets last post-season appearance was 1973. From 1974 through 1979, the Mets had a record of 432-540 (.444).
