Baltimore's defending American League champions were two games below .500 (22-24) at the end of May and in fifth place, seven games out of first. They stepped over the .500 mark for the remainder of the season, June 17<sup>th</sup>, after Steve Stone beat the Angels, 5-3, at Memorial Stadium. From that point, it was a steady climb (31 wins in 51 games) up the standings to second place July 27<sup>th</sup>--a spot they would hold until season's end. The Birds came as close as 1 1/2 games from the lead on September 4<sup>th</sup> before tailing off and then recovering to finish strong three games behind the AL East champ Yankees...Stone, who had fought off shoulder problems since 1972 (including a torn rotator cuff in 1976) used his curveball and smarts to keep on battling, earning a well-deserved AL Cy Young Award after a year with 25 wins against 7 losses--the most wins ever in a single season by an Orioles' pitcher. Southpaws Scott McGregor (20 victories) and Mike Flanagan (16 W's) both led the pitching staff with 12 complete games. Jim Palmer, 34, was a 16-game winner as well. Stone topped the staff in strikeouts (149). The pitching corps' ERA of 3.64 was third-best in the league, but they allowed the fewest runs for the year (640)...Eddie Murray raked all season long and ended the year with 32 home runs, 116 RBI, and 36 doubles--all team-highs. His slugging percentage was .519 to go with a .873 OPS. Ken Singleton's OPS was even better (.882) after hitting 24 jacks, 28 doubles, 3 triples, and 177 base hits. He collected 104 RBI. Lightning-quick Al Bumbry led the ballclub with 205 base hits and 118 runs scored. The Orioles finished sixth in the league after putting-up a .273 batting average; they were fourth in homers (156)...Baltimore had a very impressive .667 winning percentage versus division opponents (52-26). Their record against the Yankees was 7-6..
