Mike Schmidt said on many occasions that Pete Rose--and his off-the-charts leadership--would be just what the team needed to win a World Championship. In his second year with the Phils, Pete's unparalleled, infectious desire to win, led the team to their first World Series title in the franchise's 98th season. The Kansas City Royals were dispatched in six games, but not before the Phillies had to fight for their lives in a gut-wrenching NLCS versus Houston which went the five full games. The final was a dandy. The Astros took a 5-2 lead into the top of the eighth, but the Phillies pushed across five runs to take the lead. Houston came right back with two in the bottom of the inning to tie the contest. In the tenth inning at Houston, with one out, Del Unser doubled and would score from third on Garry Maddox's double to center with two out to give the Phils the lead. Dick Ruthven nailed down the victory with a one-two-three last of the tenth. Four of the five games were extra-inning affairs...Schmidt, who hit .381 with two homers and seven RBI, was the World Series MVP... "Schmitt" was the National League MVP off a season with a major league-high 48 home runs and league-leading figures in RBI (121), slugging percentage (.624), and OPS (1.004). "Michael Jack" scored the most runs on the team (104) while Rose was tops in base hits (185)...Steve Carlton was the NL Cy Young Award winner with a National League-best 24 wins and major league-high 286 strikeouts. "Lefty" was fifth in MVP voting...The ball club ended the year second in the league with a .270 BA; they were third in home runs (117)...The pitching staff's 3.43 ERA was third in the league...The roster boasted some great nicknames: "Shake 'n' Bake" McBride along with "The Secretary of Defense" and multiple gold-glover, Garry Maddox. Then there's Lonnie "Skates" Smith. Smith, possessing mercurial speed, had the darndest time staying on his feet chasing fly balls or base hits in Veteran Stadium's artificial-turf outfield.
